

EMERGENCY MANAGEMENT POLICY

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Reviewed: March 2023

Policy Applies to:

- All Mercy staff
- Compliance by Credentialed Specialists, Contractors, Visitors and Patients will be facilitated by Mercy staff.

Related Standards:

• Ngā Paerewa Health and Disability services standard

Rationale:

Mercy requires an Emergency Plan that facilitates a resilient and sustainable service that supports the best outcomes for Staff, Patients, Credentialed Specialists, Contractors, Visitors and our wider community.

Cultural Considerations:

No cultural considerations identified.

Definitions:

Emergency - an unexpected and sudden event that must be dealt with urgently

Emergency Plan - is a strategic plan for managing an emergency response

Assembly Area (AA) - A specific area where resources are organised and prepared for deployment. This is normally located away from an incident at an established facility

CD - Civil Defence

MOH- Ministry of Health

CIMSERT- (Critical Incident Management System Emergency Response Tool) - Is a manual task allocation system and emergency management tool used to coordinate an emergency response within Mercy Hospital

Debriefing - A critical examination of an operation undertaken to determine what was done successfully, what could be done better and identify future improvements

CIMS (Coordinated Incident Management System) - A structure to systematically manage emergency incidents. This is the system used in the public sector in the event of a local or national emergency.

It will be the system used in a Mercy-Te Whatu Ora coordinated response. See CIMS Appendix to Emergency Management Plan.

SERP - Site Emergency Response Plan — this is our CIMSERT tasks and task instructions

ECP - Emergency Continuity Plan

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Objectives:

- **Reduction-** identify and manage existing hazards
- Readiness- To maximise staff preparedness to minimise the impact on the Mercy Campus, of an emergency event
- **Response-** To ensure Mercy is able to respond safely to internal and external emergency events in a timely and efficient manner
- **Recovery-** To ensure that there is a robust plan in place to ensure return to business in a timely fashion

Implementation:

- Emergency Management Plan
- Risk Register Action Plan
- Emergency & Fire training is undertaken by staff initially at orientation and then annually through mandatory training
- CIMSERT based exercises with Heads of Department and staff
- Annual review of emergency systems
- Emergency procedures wall chart
- Bi annual fire evacuation practice
- Annual earthquake drill
- Fire Warden training every 2 years

Mercy Hospital's planning for an emergency includes:

- A two-system response for
 - o internal emergency management (the CIMSERT system) and externally coordinated action in conjunction with the Te Whatu Ora and other city organisations (CIMS) (see Te Whatu Ora emergency plan)
- Knowledge of/copy of Health & Disability Services City of Dunedin Civil Defence Emergency Management Plan;
- Collaborating with the Te Whatu Ora in CIMS training and exercises
- Emergency Response Plans that include:
 - o building, water or power failure
 - o ICT failure
 - o gas leak or explosion
 - o bomb threat/hold up
 - o waste management
 - o pandemic plan
 - o sudden increase in patient numbers
 - o provision of assistance in a local or regional emergency
 - o recovery plan.

Documentation required for the CIMSERT emergency response is held in the CIMSERT boxes.

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Documentation required for collaboration with Te Whatu Ora/other city agencies (CIMS) is held in the Emergency Management Box.

Evaluation:

- Completion of new staff orientation/induction
- Incident feedback
- Policy and procedures risk rated and reviewed
- Annual Emergency Plan Audit and action plan
- Feedback from mandatory training day /orientation day and ad hoc training
